Understanding CPSC eFiling for Imported Consumer Product Compliance

CPSC eFiling is a regulatory initiative requiring importers of consumer products to electronically submit compliance data elements when filing an entry with U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP).

Key Takeaways:

Scope of eFiling:

- Applies only to imported regulated consumer products.
- Domestic manufacturers are not required to eFile product certificates.
- Requires collaboration with CBP via the PGA Message Set.

Breaking it Down:

- CBP (Customs and Border Protection): The U.S. government agency responsible for overseeing imports and enforcing trade regulations.
- PGA (Partner Government Agency) Message Set: A structured electronic data format used by importers to submit product certification details directly into CBP's Automated Commercial Environment (ACE) system.
- Collaboration Requirement: Since CPSC and CBP work together to enforce import regulations, importers must electronically file compliance certificates using the PGA Message Setbefore goods arrive in the U.S.



Product Certification & Compliance

Importers must certify products and submit necessary data through eFiling.

Products requiring certification:

- Children's Product Certificate (CPC) For children's products, including toys, sleepwear, cribs, and juvenile furniture.
- General Certificate of Conformity (GCC) For general-use products like mattresses, cigarette lighters, and apparel.

Timeline

Date	Details
January 8, 2025 :	Final rule published in the Federal Register.
July 8, 2026:	eFiling requirements take effect for all regulated consumer products.
January 8, 2027	Extended provisions apply to products processed through Foreign Trade Zones (FTZs).

• The CPSC has not set an official enforcement date beyond the published schedule.

What Must be Included in a Product Certificate?

• When eFiling product certificates, importers must provide seven data elements to complete a Certificate of Compliance, as specified in <u>16 CFR 1110</u>.
